### Midlands Championship Halter Show

It looks as if we made a real success of this show last year as entries were full well before the closure date. We

had 167 entries from 28 breeders including some of the top herds in the country. Friday was set up day, constructing the pens for the exhibitors and setting up the show ring, as well as welcoming most of the breeders and their animals later in the afternoon. The animals were checked in against the entries list and any animals not present and any changes in classes noted ready for the judging on Saturday. We left all the animals tucked up in the dry for the night.





Saturday started bright and early to check in the last few exhibitors before the briefing for all the competitors from Jay and commencement of judging. Our judge, Jo Bridge, did a sterling job keeping well on track to get through all the classes ably assisted by lain who was ring steward. Anne and Adam were kept busy making sure the animals were ready in the collecting ring for the next class.





By 5pm all the animals had been judged in their classes, all champions decided for each sex and colour and finally the supreme champions were selected from the most amazing line up of champions. Our congratulations go to the Supreme Champion Huacaya—Ashwood Lanson and the Supreme Champion Suri—Evolution Assailant.









Both alpacas and exhibitors were tired by the end of the day, some with long journeys home, but the competitors busied themselves loading their animals, taking down their pens and clearing the waste into the skips. #### All about the Fibre

We mentioned in the last newsletter about running a series of informal sessions focusing on fibre. Well our plans are more concrete now and we are going to run these sessions in the new year. The first session in January will be focused on 'obtaining' your fleece. We will talk about what you can do before shearing, the shearing process and how to skirt and store your fleece. The second session will look at what you can do with the fibre including selling it, having it processed or using it yourself. And the final session will focus on all the

different things you can do yourself with alpaca fleece—spinning, weaving, knitting and crochet, wet felting, needle felting, rug making etc.

These are really intended to be information sharing events rather than structured talks. But we hope that we can all learn from each other - even simple little tips that make everything easier. By talking together we can either structure more formal sessions that are of interest, advise on courses already available or we may be able to talk about co-operative ideas that would be of benefit to us all. For example, analysis of fleece samples gets cheaper with volume so maybe we could combine our samples to benefit from reduced costs.

We hope you will come and join us for a cup of tea and cake and a chat about alpacas and their fibre. The cost will be £5 for members .

# Pauline Key

The dream of keeping alpacas grew steadily for 4 years. My husband and I lived near Haywards Heath and had friends with alpacas, reindeer and goats. On visiting them, I was hooked.

It is a fantastic group to be involved with. One minute we are erecting hurdles and the next announcing the next class and the next meeting some of the extraordinary people who show their animals. I love it and all those involved in the alpaca world.





## Jay Holland

My wife Hilary and I have been keeping alpacas for nearly 15 years, the last 11 of them full time.

We started with 4 huacaya, 3 pregnant females and a castrated male on roughly 4 acres of land having been introduced to alpacas by my mother who, whilst house hunting in Devon, came across these "genetically modified Exmoor sheep" who were, apparently, specially bred to look over Devon hedges?!

Having come from an office based background we embarked on an educational odyssey about alpacas and simply fell in love with

them culminating in our herd of currently some 91 equally split between huacaya and suri.

Along the way, helping at various shows and educational events, attending the available BAS courses and travelling to the States to learn specific alpaca handling techniques, I found myself privileged to be offered a chance of becoming a BAS Judge. So, with the decision made, I attended further learning opportunities and apprenticed under several judges culminating in my obtaining my first judges badge in 2011. I have retained my judges qualification twice through recertification and am now a qualified BAS Tutor and am the current Chair of Judges.

I have also had the honour of being invited to sit on the Board of the BAS 3 times, having done so twice, and am currently supporting the BAS by being a member of the Judges Committee, Education Committee, Welfare Committee and advisor to the Show Rules Committee.

We have a passion for alpaca and in sharing that through education, advice and general help.
