## **Breeding Decisions**







A small group of us met to learn more about how to make the best breeding choices for our animals. Jay took us through the theory and talked about the things to consider when making your decisions such as fibre quality, colour, confirmation, temperament, traits passed on by the sire and dam etc. Roger then introduced us to three of his stud males talking about their attributes, then moved on to groups of cria's sired by those studs and how the stud had influenced the attributes of the cria and where the female's attributes had influenced the outcome. We learnt that some studs improve cria from most dams and are known as improvers while others sire very good cria from good dams but don't particularly improve cria from less good dams. But the overriding message was to choose your breeder carefully and use their wealth of knowledge about their studs ability to influence his offspring.









## Liz Welch

Hi all, my name is Liz and I was elected to join the WSAG committee at the AGM in February, the following is just a little bit about me and my Alpacas.

My husband and I live near Ledbury on a small farm, my Dad has lived here all of his life due to some health issues the ground had been left and was looking rather unloved and overgrown. After a fair bit of head scratching and tutting over what to do with the land we started looking at suitable animals to maintain the 4 usable acres. Kev and I spent a long time looking into various options, Angora goats were talked about a lot. When it came to it they were just not quite right for what we needed. We then started talking to people about Camelids, visited a Llama farm (too big for me) then moved to Alpacas. The rest is history, within 4 weeks 4 Alpacas had been delivered, 2 weeks later the beast from the east hit and it was a baptism of fire! From my own experience I would now always recommend a handling course before deciding to take on any animal. Through the



online community we met up with Jay and Hillary, have done a handling course and joined this group.

We are lucky to have enough space for Alpacas, Chickens and Bagot Goats. Kev's plan for the animals was always land management, the Alpacas do a fantastic job of keeping the grass down and the goats tidy up all of the brambles, so he is happy. Mine was much more towards the craft side, I have learnt to felt, had a go at dyeing and have spinning, crochet and weaving on my list of things to learn.
